UPDATED INFORMATION!

CHANGES TO WHAT BIG HILL PS DOES ON AN EXTREME FIRE DANGER DAY THIS SEASON

To help families distinguish what school looks like for Big Hill PS on different fire danger days, we will be using this graphic below to help communicate clearly:



MODERATE Big Hill Primary School will **OPERATE** as usual

HIGH Big Hill Primary School will **OPERATE** and Monitor Conditions

EXTREME Big Hill Primary School to **RELOCATE** to Kangaroo Flat Primary School

CATASTROPHIC Big Hill Primary School will **CLOSE**

On an Extreme Day, instead of dropping your children off at Big Hill PS, you would drop them off at KFPS where they would be met at **GATE 4** by Big Hill PS staff who would then run classes with Big Hill PS students only in the KFPS gym.

We would also have separate play times to KFPS students - in essence we run a Big Hill PS day with students and staff onsite at KFPS, but have separate work areas and play times, including different drop off and pick up times. We are not allowed to have anyone, including staff, onsite at Big Hill PS on an Extreme Day.

It is important to note two additional considerations for families:

- 1.) OUT OF SCHOOL HOURS CARE will be cancelled. There will be no option on an EXTREME FIRE DAY for OSHC as a result. Families would need to drop off at KFPS **after 8:50am** and pick up soon after 3:15pm.
- 2.) Both buses – the town Christians Bus and our Ravenswood bus **will not run**. For those who use the buses, you would need to also drop off and pick up during the above times too.

These factors may or may not change your ability to get to KFPS ...so your family then has the decision to make – send to KFPS between 8:50am and 3:15pm OR make other arrangements for them to stay home or spend the day with a family member. Also understand that this decision to relocate on EXTREME FIRE DAYS is made by the Department of Education under guidance from Emergency Management and in the best interests of keeping students, staff and the community safe. We will continue to keep you updated as we approach the official FIRE DANGER SEASON which commences on October 1st.

If an Extreme Day is called in Term 4, we must close and relocate. We won't know when this is occurring until 4:00pm the day before an Extreme Day, so please commence checking Compass each afternoon as we move into Term 4 and beyond.

STUDENT SUPPORT GROUP (SSG) MEETINGS NEXT WEEK

Today and Friday (10th and 11th of September) Ainsley, our Disability Inclusion Lead, has met/or will meet with families and class teachers to run important SSG meetings for Term 3. If you have booked in for a meeting, please make sure you keep the appointment as the two days are fully booked and times are scheduled to run on time. If you can't make it, please ring and we can do a phone appointment if needed.

CLASS PLACEMENT FOR 2027 – PARENT / CARER REQUESTS ARE OPEN

Next year might be a little way off, but planning for our classes and structures is underway. Each year we give families the chance to inform / persuade us by seeking your opinions about where your child is best placed. At this stage we anticipate a similar structure to this year with a FIRST STEPS / FOUNDATION, JUNIOR, MIDDLE and SENIOR UNITS, however we cannot predict where teachers will be in 2027 yet. If you are emailing me to put in a request, please read through the attached CLASS PLACEMENT POLICY before doing so, to ensure your request is in line with the policy. Some of the usual requests might be children to be placed with or placed away from children, changing teacher because your child has worked with that teacher already, academic stretch (eg: a Year 3/4 class over a Year 2/3 or a Year 5/6 class over a Year 4/5), remaining with a teacher because it's been very beneficial, requesting your child's first male / female teacher etc. It's not a I DON'T WANT opportunity. Past requests are null and void, so if there is a historical reason we need to consider, please email me. If you have spoken to a teacher about your request, still email me. If it's not in writing to me, it won't be considered – so please email Matthew.Pearce@education.vic.gov.au before the closing date to be considered. All class placement requests need to be received by the first Friday of Term 4 – Friday, 9th October. Not trying to be difficult 😊 just making sure your request is received and considered and for that to occur... please ensure you email me directly. Thanks for your support!

DIVISION ATHLETICS MONDAY

Monday, 14th September will be a busy day for some of our selected Year 3 – 6's when they take part in the Division Athletics at the Spring Gully Athletics Track. As only a few students are attending, individual families are asked to transport and supervise their children at the event if selected. We aren't sending a staff member due to low numbers. Good luck to selected students who have been chosen to attend 😊.

RACV SAFETY SQUAD INCURSION

Our Foundation and Junior Units will enjoy an incursion next Monday, 14th September with the RACV Safety Squad visit to work with our students. This will occur throughout the day for each class... and will focus on road safety etc.

LOCKOUT DRILL

We have a Lockout Drill next Tuesday at midday. This will be a rehearsal for one building only... and we expect to practice this with our Year 5/6's evacuating to the undercover area. As part of Emergency Management, we also need to practise evacuating only a small area of the school and this drill is that opportunity. Please remind your child if they are in Year 5/6 that there will be a short drill on Tuesday.

END OF TERM AWARDS

Next Friday, 18th September will see us awarding our END OF TERM STUDENT AWARDS in each class to students who have worked well in ENGLISH, MATHS and SPECIALIST classes or have demonstrated OUTSTANDING SCHOOL VALUES. Winners will be announced in our final newsletter next Thursday, 17th September, enabling parents / carers to come along if they can on the Friday morning. The assembly will be at 9:00am in the undercover area, weather permitting. If wet, we will advise alternate arrangements for the same morning and times.

EARLY DISMISSAL / END OF TERM

Next Friday, 18th September we will dismiss for the holidays at 2:30pm. Buses will run at this earlier time and OSHC is available for those that need it. Outside of buses and OSHC, families are asked to pick up at 2:30pm. Our Office will close at 3:00pm ready for the holiday period. The school holidays will then run from Monday, 21st September until Sunday, 4th October when Term 4 commences on Monday, 5th October.

Navigating the Digital World: Your GPS for the Online Adventure

Discord: The Good, the Bad and the Ugly

Your child says they're "just chatting with their mates"... but what exactly is this Discord?

If you have a tween or teen in your house, there's a fair chance you've heard the word Discord floating around.

Perhaps you've even asked what it is and received that wonderfully detailed teenage explanation:

"It's just where we talk."

Righto. Thanks for clearing that up!

But Discord is worth knowing a little more about, particularly as Australian kids navigate a changing online world following the introduction of the under 16 social media restrictions. Because Discord isn't simply somewhere kids send the occasional message to a mate. They can chat, game, share, create, watch, listen and hang out in entire online communities. So, saddle up. In true Western fashion, we're taking a look at...

The Good, the Bad and the Ugly

The Good

Let's give Discord a fair go first. For plenty of young people, Discord can be a genuinely positive place. Kids can chat with their real-life mates while gaming, work together on projects and join communities based around things they love, whether that's gaming, art, coding, sport, music, animals or something so incredibly specific that the adults in the house have absolutely no idea what they're talking about.

For some kids, finding other people who get excited about the same things they do can provide a genuine sense of connection and belonging. So, Discord itself isn't automatically the villain wearing the black hat. Where kids go and who they interact with makes a huge difference. Which brings us neatly to...

The Bad

Discord works a little differently from the social media platforms many parents know. Users can join online communities called servers. Think of a server as a giant digital clubhouse. Your child's mates might be inside. There might be a room for gaming, another for footy, another for music and another dedicated entirely to some game character you've apparently committed a major parenting offence by not recognising.

But depending on the server, there could also be a whole bunch of people your child has never met wandering around that clubhouse.

Users can communicate through text, voice and video. They can share images, files and links, and conversations can move from public channels into private direct messages.

Suddenly... *"I'm just chatting with my mates"*
...covers a fairly large paddock.

And there's another thing worth knowing. Discord can be accessed through phones and tablets, but also on computers and through a web browser. So, checking your child's phone and declaring "No Discord app here, beauty!" doesn't necessarily mean they aren't using it. And then we mosey on over to...

The Ugly

Unfortunately, just like almost every large online space, Discord has people who use it for all the wrong reasons. Young people can encounter inappropriate or explicit content, cyberbullying, scams, fake accounts and strangers pretending to be someone they're not.

There are also more serious risks, including grooming and extortion, where someone builds trust with a young person or pressures them into sharing intimate images and then uses those images to threaten or manipulate them. Another big red flag is someone encouraging a child to keep a conversation secret, move into private messages or jump across to another app where there may be fewer protections.

That's when our kids need to know:

- You can leave.
- You can block.
- You can report.
- And you can tell an adult.
- Even if you replied.
- Even if you did something you know you shouldn't have.
- Even if you're sitting there thinking, Mum or Dad is going to absolutely lose it.
- Getting help is more important than getting into trouble.
- EVERY SINGLE TIME.

Hang on... I thought under 16s were banned from social media?

Here's the curly bit for Australian parents. Australia's under 16 social media restrictions *do not currently include Discord*. Discord is treated differently because it primarily operates as a messaging and gaming communication service rather than one of the age restricted social media platforms. That doesn't mean it's a free for all. Discord's minimum age in Australia is 13. So while your 13, 14 or 15 year old may no longer be allowed an account on some social media platforms, they may still be using Discord. Basically, the Government has shut the front gate on several social media platforms.

That doesn't mean there aren't a few side gates still open.

And anyone who has ever tried to keep a determined kid, dog or chook contained knows that the side gate is usually where you need to be looking.

But surely Discord has safety settings?

It does. Discord has safety features designed to protect younger users, including sensitive content filters, warnings around potentially unfamiliar friend requests, reporting tools and age assurance measures. Those things matter. But no amount of whiz bang technology replaces a young person knowing when something doesn't feel right and knowing what to do about it.

That's where we come in.

The Parent Tip Box

You don't need to march into the lounge tonight and announce:

"RIGHT. EVERYONE HAND OVER YOUR DISCORD."

Nothing opens the lines of communication with a teenager quite like an unexpected digital raid by Mum or Dad. Instead, try curiosity. Ask them to show you Discord. Ask what they like about it. Ask:

"What servers are you in?"

"What are they about?"

"How did you find them?"

"Do you actually know the people you're talking to?"

"Can strangers message you privately?"

"Do you use voice chat?"

And one of the most important:

"What would you do if somebody sent you something that made you uncomfortable?"

Have a squiz at the privacy and safety settings together too. Make sure your child understands that someone being friendly online doesn't mean they automatically get access to personal information such as their full name, school, phone number, address or location. And make sure they know they can come to you when something goes pear shaped. Because "Mum or Dad's going to kill me" should never be the reason a kid stays stuck in an unsafe situation.

The Bottom Line

Discord isn't simply **good**.

It isn't automatically bad.

And it certainly isn't all **ugly**.

For many kids, it can be a fun, creative and social part of their digital world. But two kids using Discord can have completely different experiences.

Same app. Different servers.

Different people. Different risks.

We don't need to chuck on a gaming headset, pull up a chair and pretend we understand every meme, gaming reference and bit of teenage slang. But we probably should know which digital clubhouse our kids have wandered into. So have a yarn. Ask the questions. Keep the conversations low pressure. And make sure your kids know that if something online ever feels dodgy, uncomfortable or just plain wrong, they can come to you first and sort out the rest later. Because when it comes to Discord, and the whole digital world for that matter:

Curious conversations build trust.

And that's one safety feature you won't find buried somewhere in the settings menu.

*Safe travels on the internet highway,
where your data's the passenger,
and you're the navigator!*

CLASS PLACEMENT POLICY FOR 2027

Purpose

To create the best possible learning environment, which is equitable, to all students and their families.

Guidelines

- 1. That the underlying principles are educational and in the best interests of all children,*
- 2. That involvement in the process is within the framework of specified criteria,*
- 3. That the final responsibility for class placement and / or pupil movement remains primarily with the Principal / delegate.*

Implementation

- The specified criteria for movement of a child from one class to another are as follows:
 - Special needs of children (ie: emotional, psychological, behavioural, disabilities),
 - Equitable distribution of children (ie: learning, gender, behaviour considerations),
 - Within Unit requests (ie: for children to be placed or not placed within a class for family groupings),
 - Flexibility in grouping will be encouraged in movement between Units or Year levels,
 - Children should have at least one friend accompany him or her to the next class,
 - Parents of a Preschool child are provided with the opportunity to indicate a friend with whom they would like their child placed as part of the enrolment process.
- People who may be involved in the class selection process are as follows:
 - The child's class teacher,
 - The school's transition teachers,
 - Parent(s) of a special needs child,
 - Parent(s) who have views regarding family grouping,
 - Other staff involved in the child's education, such as specialists who have specific special needs information,
 - Preschool staff,
 - Foundation, Junior Unit, Middle Unit and Senior Unit staff,
 - The Principal.
- Parents are to write to the Principal stating any educational considerations by **Friday, 9th October**.
 - Records of decisions which have been made regarding placement of children for various reasons, especially behaviour, will be kept,
 - The Principal / delegate will be responsible for keeping this information,
 - All requests will receive either a verbal or written reply, so parents understand staff reasons for student placement.
- If there has been an ongoing concern during the year and there has been contact between the parent, teacher and Principal, a child could be moved to another class in the following year. This action should take place only after discussions with the Principal / delegate and the involved parties.
- In the event of new students altering the class structure or dynamics, some children may need to be moved to another class early in the school year.

Student enrolment numbers will be a major factor in determining class structures.

Medical Management Plan & Medication



All children who have been diagnosed with a medical condition including allergies, food/chemical intolerances, anaphylaxis, asthma, epilepsy will need to provide:

- ☐ a completed Medical Management Plan with a colour photo
- ☐ necessary medication

Please note it is a legal requirement under the Education & Care National Regulations and the Terms and Conditions for booking that these are provided.

In the interests of child safety, care may be refused on the day should the appropriate documentation or medication or medication not be supplied.

Child Care Subsidy



Please note that subsidised hours are calculated and allocated by Centrelink on a fortnightly basis. Check Centrelink for eligibility.

Fortnightly childcare subsidised hours

Each session is calculated using the full service operational hours, not the hours attended by the child.

Additional Child Care subsidy will not cover any hours beyond the subsidised hours per fortnight.

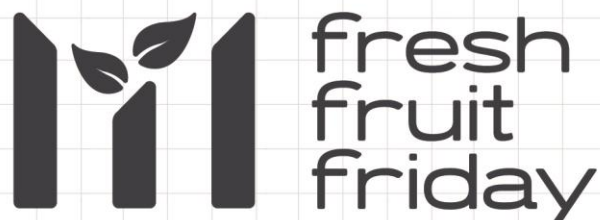

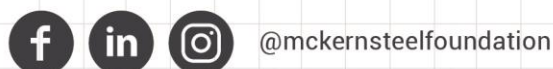
